VIDEO AUDIO DISCO: Employing Active Methods in the Latin Classroom

The first part of this workshop will focus on the Post- Medieval literary field of Neo-Latin literature which offers Latinists thousands of fictional and non-fictional works in prose and poetry. Passages from non-fictional works in prose from the Natural Sciences (*Historia Naturalis et Philosophia Naturalis*) will put us in direct contact with some of history's greatest thinkers. The second part of this workshop will draw from UMass Boston's one-week summer immersion Latin program. Emphasis will be on how to teach Caesar's *Bellum Gallicum* actively in the classroom.
